# **WELCOME**

Welcome to our first Parish Council Newsletter. The Council is trying new ways to communicate with residents.

We will be publishing two newsletters a year, which which you will be able to read on our website, on OIS and and as part of a full run of the Owslebury newsletter.

As this is the first addition, we felt it is an appropriate time to explain what the Parish Council does.

## WHO ARE WE

Parish and Town Councils are the grassroots of local democracy and have a greater understanding of the views and interests within their localities. The Parish Council is the level of government closest to the community, with Winchester City Council and Hampshire County Council above it. As it is the authority closest to the people, the Parish Council is invariably the first choice for people to go with concerns or ideas. For this reason, it is a vital part of any community.

Elections to the parish council are held every four years, with the most recent at Owslebury and Morestead in 2022. In Owslebury there are seven seats on the Parish Council, current there is 1 vacancy.

The Council makes decisions on behalf of the people in the Parish and makes representations on their behalf to other bodies. The Council is also a statutory consultee on all planning applications received by the South Downs National Park and Winchester City Council. The Full Council consider and agree the Council's response at the meetings.





#### HOW DOES THE COUNCIL OPERATE ON A DAY-TO-DAY BASIS?



The Parish Council employs a Parish Clerk. The Parish Clerk fulfils the statutory duty of Proper Office, and at Owslebury and Morestead, also fulfils the statutory role of Responsible Finance Officer

The Parish Clerk is responsible for the operational running of the Parish Council and ensuring that the decisions of the Parish Council are enacted. The Parish Clerk reports to the Council as a body.

The Parish Council is principally funded by its precept, which is the parish council's share of your council tax. The precept demand goes to the billing authority, Winchester City Council, which collects the tax for the Parish Council.

The precept is determined by the Parish Council who agree an annual budget each year. For the forthcoming year, 2023/24, Owslebury and Morestead Parish Council have agreed a 10% increase against last year's precept. This equates to an increase of £9.78 per household per year (based on a Band D property).

The precept pays for Owslebury and Morestead Parish Council for the following:

- Maintain the Hilly Close playground.
- Maintain the Longwood Road sportsground
- Maintain the Glebe Field
- Maintain the Telephone Box
- Staff Costs (Clerk and Accredited Community Safety Officer)
- Administration Costs
- Grants for local charities
- Money for community projects

If you want to know about the Council and how the decisions are made, why not come to one of our meetings? Members of the public are welcome to attend all meetings to listen to them and may address Cllrs about items on the agenda in the public session.




# **VOLUNTERING WITH THE PARISH COUNCIL**

#### **SPEEDWATCH**

The Parish Council agreed at the September meeting to asked for volunteers to set up a SpeedWatch team in Owslebury. The Council had a response from six residents. The Council then identified places in the village that the SpeedWatch team can use, to send to the police to check.

The Council sent a list of eight potential sites to the police for checking and the Council are waiting for a reply from them. Once the Council receive a response, they will be able to progress this further.





#### **PATH WARDEN**



The Council have four Path Wardens who help keep local rights of way accessible and enjoyable for the community. The Wardens are trained to carry out small scale maintenance works and light vegetation clearance so they can help the countryside service look after their local routes. They report issues on the Hampshire ROW (Right of Way) map.

They work with the community engagement ranger who will send job sheets when issues are reported by the public.
